## Year 5 curriculum 'in advance' T2

Subject	What we are learning in T2	How parents/carers can help
English	Pupils will be reading 'Robot Girl' by Malorie Blackman which will lead to a range of writing opportunities. Pupils will learn about modal verbs, adverbs, relative clauses, the punctuation of dialogue, expanded noun phrases, adverbials of time and manner and parenthesis and will use these in their writing.  In their whole-class reading they will continue to explore high-quality texts, with a focus on fluency and comprehension.  Spelling lessons will cover homophones, cial/tial and cious/tious endings and words on the Y5/6 statutory spelling list.	Support your child with weekly homework, which will include pages from their CGP book and weekly spellings to learn. Encourage children to read independently and listen to them read. Talk to your child about what they are reading. All reads should be logged in planners, with an adult's signature at least three times a week.
Maths	<ul> <li>Multiplication and division:</li> <li>Understand multiples and factor pairs of a number, prime and composite numbers and square and cube numbers and their notation. Multiply and divide whole numbers and those involving decimals by 10, 100 and 1000</li> <li>Fractions:</li> <li>Find equivalent fractions and convert between mixed numbers and improper fractions. Add and subtract fractions with denominators that are multiples of the same number</li> </ul>	Support with homework set and times table practice by asking your child to recall multiplication and division facts (Times Tables Rockstars will provide practice for those who know their facts). For fractions, cut cakes/pizzas etc to show equivalent fractions, mixed numbers and improper fractions.
